

It was another fantastic BAISS Soccer Competition for St Andrews Hurricanes with all four of our teams making the BAISS playoff stages after a hard fought season. The Junior and Senior girls teams both ended up finishing in 3rd place, but the Junior and Senior boys both came through difficult semi final matches to make their respective finals. The junior boys who were looking for a third BAISS title in a row unfortunately finished second in the final. The Senior Boys who had struggled to make the finals last year, showed why they deserved to be there this year and fought hard right up until the final whistle, despite injuries and frustrations. They were disappointed with their second place finish but, like the players on all of our teams, were a credit to St Andrew's.

On the back of the BAISS Championships and for the first time, all four of St Andrew's football teams were involved in the National Soccer Finals. The timing of the finals unfortunately affected both of our senior teams with exams making it difficult to train and play. They were of course up against the best teams from all of the islands, but they were still disappointed to leave the competition at the playoff stage.

Our two junior teams were straight into semi final matchups. The Junior Boys were disappointed to lose a semifinal that they had dominated in the first half but they were a credit to the school and worked hard for each other until the final whistle. More than half of the team this season has comprised of Grade 7 students and it was fantastic that they had an opportunity to play at this level so early on in high school.

The Junior Girls team comfortably won their semi-final match 3-0 and progressed into the final the next day. Unfortunately they faced fresh opposition who had been awarded a bye into the final and may well have been the difference. Finishing 2nd in the National Championships is an outstanding achievement.

Students had been working hard in training, though many had come of the back of representing the school in Baseball as well!

Taylor Moss once again demonstrated that she is one of the best 400m hurdlers on the island, easily making it into the final on the last day. Our U15 4x100m relay team also made it into the finals with a strong performance and we picked up further points in the 800m, 3000m and discus. It was frustrating to miss out in other events by just a few cm or fractions of a second, but there was no disputing the efforts of all of our athletes. Many of our athletes realised the long term work required to reach and sustain the levels of display and resolved to start training earlier in the year next year.

In March, students from both our Primary and Secondary schools participated in the National Capital Bank Golf Tournament. Our lower primary girls team placed first with Liv Ward winning the event and Samantha Mahelis coming second. Savannah Mackey helped the team to victory by coming 7th place overall individually.


Wheelie Party
